Students will be able: to define the principal units at the level of phonetics and phonology; identify and describe the speech organs used in speech production and describe their function in speech production, at the graphic level they will be able to use the IPA symbols in phonetic transcription, recognize and distinguish the aspects of phones, phonemes, and graphemes; understand the differences between monophthongs, diphthongs and triphthongs, as well as to memorize the types of such sounds in the English sound system; describe the characteristics of phones and allophones; understand the basic variations of allophones; identify, differentiate and describe the articulatory specifics of connected speech and to interpret their differences from those articulated in isolation; describe and analyse the syllabic components of words; memorize, recognize and use the basic intonation patterns and understand the functions of such patterns in speech.
