<b>Learning Outcomes</b>	The students will learn the basic morphologic traits of the English language (especially in terms of word-formation) and will be capable of conducting individual morphologic analysis of texts in English.			
<b>Enrolment Requirements</b>	The students have to be enrolled in the 3rd semester of undergraduate programme of English language and literature			
<b>Course contents</b>	The aim of this course is to prepare the students for individual morphological analysis of lexemes in the English language. The students will be acquainted with the basic notions of English morphology, basic theoretical assumptions about the fundamental units in morphology, adopt the rules of various modes of word-formation in English and gain insight into various historical and contact influences on English morphology. The methods used in this course are: lectures, seminars, which include solving tasks from lectures, seminar papers with a topic from the domain of English morphology, reading additional literature from the selected units and oral presentation of the seminar papers.

<b>Conditions for Obtaining Signatures</b>	Minimum 70% attendance, accepted seminar paper, holding the presentation
<b>Mark Grading Scale</b>	<p>Mid-terms and end-of-terms are written exams which include a certain number of multiple-choice questions. Every correct answer brings a certain percentage depending on the total number of tasks. The result of the exam is the percentage of correct answers. The grade is formed based on the scale of percentages of possible results: from 0 to 59% – F; from 60 to 69% – D; from 70 to 79% – C; from 80 to 89% – B, from 90 to 100% – A.</p> <p>Seminar papers are not graded; seminar papers can be accepted or rejected. If the seminar paper is rejected, the student should make the necessary adjustments to the paper until it is accepted in order to take the final exam.</p>
<b>Final Grade Calculation</b>	The final grade is calculated as the mean value of the two mid-terms. If a student does not pass one or both mid-terms, they are required to take the final exam. In that case, the final grade is formed based on the final exam.
<b>Comments</b>	If a student is not satisfied with the grade as the mean value of the two mid-terms, they can make an arrangement with the teacher to take the final exam in order to get a better result and a higher grade.
