Course Description:

During this course students will demonstrate their understanding of the complex regionalization of United States and Canada. Many factors lead to regions such as language, economics, political, nationality, and physical environments. This course will approach regions in the US and Canada for both a systematic approach and also topic perspective. Concepts of regionalism (single or multiple) Urban, Suburb, exurban, rural and not regionalism will be the focus.

General Notes about the Course

This course is intended for you to get to learn more about the United States and Canada at both and academic level but also more of human scale of experience. I encourage all students to speak to me about any questions you have about the US and Canada. I will be running this course in an American style so you may find differences at first. By the end of the term you will more comfortable about how class will operate.

Exams

Dates will be set after the semester starts. The final exam is not comprehensive. The second final exam date will be used to retake any of the three exams during the semester. **Students that attend 90% of the classes will be allowed to retake one of the exams**.

Map Interpretation Exercise

You will examine a set of maps and interpret the regional aspect of the maps and justify your results in a short 1 page paper. We will do a draft of the paper to work on the English writing.

Contemporary Geography in the USA and Canada Presentation

You will be given a list of topics to choose from. In this project you will research your selected topic on contemporary North American culture and you will present a 4 slide 5 minute PowerPoint presentation on you topic to the class. During your research process you will meet with Dr. Cammack to review you research and presentation before the in class presentation.

Student Class Conduct

Academic Integrity Policy

Materials covered by this prohibition include, but are not limited to, text, video, audio, images, photographs, websites, electronic and online materials, and other intellectual property.

4. Abuse of Academic Materials and/or Equipment

Destroying, defacing, stealing, or making inaccessible library or other academic resource material.

5. **Complicity in Academic Dishonesty** Helping or attempting to help another student to commit an act of academic dishonesty.

6. Falsifying Grade Reports

Changing or destroying grades, scores or markings on an examination or in an instructor's records.

7. Misrepresentation to Avoid Academic Work

Misrepresentation by fabricating an otherwise justifiable excuse such as illness, injury, accident, etc., in order to avoid timely submission of academic work or to avoid or delay the taking of a test or examination.

8. Originality

Misrepresenting work as newly created original work, when the work already has been submitted for another assignment or course without substantial revision.
