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	linguistics; independently write an essay on a given topic; manage to solve a simple research problem individually; independently write some homework assignments on given topics.																
Learning outcomes at the Programme level	Upon graduation, students will be able to: define, explain and classify the basic types of loanwords and loan translation (in the contact of English and Croatian primarily); recognize and understand the language level(-s) of loanword adaptation according to their characteristic elements and structure; deepen the understanding of the impact of transferonyms (loanwords) from the English language, their place and importance in contemporary Croatian language, their adaptation (orthographic, phonological and formational features, change of meaning and meaning relations); independently conduct a small research work in the field of contact linguistics; to understand and use specific methodological approaches in analyzing the adaptation of loanwords.
