Course description	The course gives insight into some of the essential narratives of the Victorian period, observed relation to the dominant historical and cultural context (imperial expansion, political economy, t development of science and technology, etc.) At the same time, the course does not neglect t narratives' specificity which constitutes them as works of art (the analysis of narrative technique versification etc.) The course begins with some of the canonical historical-social novels, focusing authors such as Charles Dickens, Elizabeth Gaskell, and the Brontë sisters, and ends with atypic examples of Victorian prose (aestheticism, decadence) that emphasize the transition towards litera modernism. The course also focuses on some of the most skilled and self-conscious poets of t Victorian age, such as Alfred, Lord Tennyson, Robert Browning, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, a Christina Rossetti. Alongside the dominant genres of the period, attention is also paid to popul forms, such as fiction and science fiction. Consequently, the course also deals with authors such as G. Wells and Lewis Carroll.
